

The State We Live In Oklahoma and Pending Legislation

In this time of misinformation we have difficulty following truth. At the federal level we see so many opposing views and statements that it has become nearly impossible to know what is true, and what is false.

Since Joe Biden has been sworn in there has been a flurry of executive orders and cabinet positions assigned. In this article we will look at some legislation being introduced which may be of interest.

The majority of these proposed "bills" will be on the state level. There is also some noteworthy items to look at the federal level.

H.R. 127 is one such bill being introduced at the federal level that seriously challenges Second Amendment Rights.

Don Spencer, president of the Oklahoma Second Amendment Association, has a very good summary of this and other bills on the FB OK2A Discussion page. To break it down, it will simply do the following:


Create a registration system that anyone has access to, including military, all governmental agencies, and even the public. All guns, including serial numbers, and the location stored within the home will become public knowledge.

Everyone in the home will have to have a psychological exam by an approved psychologist. They will ask others about you including people who may have ulterior motives.

I will try to reference bill numbers when I can, but some have not been assigned numbers yet.

I will try to give brief summaries of the bills, as time will not allow me to go in depth. SB 18, Senate Bill, is one of the bills being introduced that will make Oklahoma a second amendment sanctuary state.

This bill, introduced by Senator Bergstrom, will go a long way in the direction of protecting Second amendment rights. Some may be thinking, "Why are second amendment rights important to Christians?" Well, the sword was the defensive weapon of the day, and Jesus made a comment about this subject in Luke 22:36.



You will have to register all guns, certain guns will be banned as well as certain ammo. You will have to have 24 hours of training just to get a license, and an additional 24 for certain class of weapons including many semiautomatic weapons many people already own.

You would also have to pay \$800 y e arly insurance to the government. Possession of large capacity magazines, drums... etc. will be a crime. This is just a partial summary, it gets even worse because of huge fines and lengthy prison time for non compliance.

This week I spent time talking to our state's lieutenant governor, two state senators and a state representative. They were making us aware of some things that may be of concern to the people of Oklahoma. "Then said he unto them, But now, he that hath a purse, let him take it, and likewise his scrip: and he that hath no sword, let him sell his garment and buy one."

One of the benefits of this bill is that it will help restrict unconstitutional federal overreach. The aforementioned federal bill, H.R. 127 is full of restrictions that violate the "shall not be infringed" clause of the second amendment.

SB 451 sponsored by Senator Bergstrom, will help with the protection of private property. This bill expands the castle doctrine to the limits of your property, not just the boundaries of your home.

Also, if you had to produce, or show a weapon in the defense of life or property

New Date Annual Scholarship Gala

Central Baptist College has announced a new date for its 2nd Annual Scholarship Gala. Planned for February 20, 2021, the event will now take place on Saturday, June 5 at 6:00pm at the Conway Expo Center.

The black-tie optional event will be catered by Central Baptist College Dining Services under the direction of Chef Jill McCollum.

The night will be a celebration of patriotism and faith and will feature keynote speaker, Ret. Lt Col Brian Birdwell. The proceeds from the event benefit the Central Baptist College Scholarship Fund which supports institutionally funded scholarships.

"Due to the ongoing uncertainty surrounding the COVID-19 global health pandemic and with vaccine implementation currently underway, we felt it was best to postpone this event until late spring," said Central Baptist College President Terry Kimbrow.

"It is important to us to be able to host an in-person event, and to hold the event when our supporters will feel more comfortable coming together to celebrate Christian higher education. I am excited for attendees to hear the inspirational



message that Ret. Lt Col Birdwell will bring,"

About Ret. Lt Col Brian Birdwell: On September 11, 2001, when American Airlines Flight 77 was crashed just yards away from his second floor Pentagon office, Ret. Lt Col Brian Birdwell was critically wounded and severely burned.

> Of the burns that covered more than 60 percent of his body, nearly half were third degree in severity.

Today, following 39 operations, months of



hospitalization and numerous skin grafts, Brian has made a miraculous recovery. Despite physical limitations, he testifies not only to his physical healing, but the ultimate miracle of grace through Christ.

In 2004, he authored a book, Refined by Fire: A Family's Triumph of Love and Faith, with his wife, Mel. He has served in the Texas State Senate since 2010.

it would not be considered brandishing. HB (House Bill) 1056 would clearly establish that places of worship are essential. This would prohibit government from closing churches during times of crisis.

- Municipal Employee Carry introduced to allow municipal employees to be legally allowed to carry in some buildings with the approval of the city council.
- Teacher Carry Teachers with a valid SDA license would be able to carry in class with school board approval. A person with a valid SDA could

carry a concealed handgun while at the capitol.

- College Campus Carry Person with a valid SDA License could carry on college campus with some other restrictions.
- Blocking of Roadways Provides physical and civil protections to a driver of a vehicle who is on a roadway that is unlawfully blocked by a mob or looters.

There are efforts underway to refine ambiguous and improper language to make things clearer. Currently, a

convicted felon could be riding in a car with someone who is a SDA license holder, and could be arrested for unknowingly being in a car with someone who is in the legal possession of a firearm.

We have legislation introduced for a statewide mandate to wear masks, and other legislation prohibiting governmental agencies from mandating masks.

There are efforts to keep vaccinations as a personal choice, and employment could not be effected by taking or not taking a vaccine. A person could not be denied their rights or services based on vaccination choice.

Another bill would prohibit the use of state funds against the second amendment. Home based students could not be penalized because a firearm, or the image of a firearm, is displayed on or in their property during distance learning sessions. Five year SDA cards could be used in lieu of background check when purchasing a firearm.

There are other bills which have the objective of protecting the civil liberties, our rights, of Oklahomans. We have some good legislators who are trying to do what is best for the citizens of the state of Oklahoma.

2021 BMA of America Meeting **Postponed**

A Zoom call was held on Tuesday January 12 with the officers of the BMA of America, the Executive Directors of the departments of the BMAA, the directors or officers of the BMAA Auxiliaries, the BMAA Production Team, and Richard Smith, host pastor of the 2021 national meeting.

The purpose of the virtual meeting was to discuss the feasibility of holding the national meeting at the regularly announced time in April 2021.

The decision to move forward with hosting a physical meeting of the national association in April 2021 was made the third week in October 2020. Since that time, things have changed.

In the state of Arkansas, and in an around Waxahachie, TX, the number of new COVID-19 cases is setting a record almost every day.
