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## The Myths of the Critical Race Theory

One of the most charged issues that we are facing in Oklahoma right now is surrounding HB1775, which prohibits Critical Race Theory from being taught in schools.

When this bill came to the Oklahoma house floor for discussion, there were a few intense moments as opposing views were expressed. The opposition's claim was presented that this bill was an attack against teaching history.

Let it be understood that this is absolutely not the intention of this bill. There was an attempt to block the bill by using false supposition and emotion to try and discredit Republican support for this bill. It is known that when the left does not have facts to support its argument, they will attempt to sway people with emotions.

The bill's intention is to prohibit teaching that any race or gender is superior to another. The idea of white privilege or all white people are racist is wrong and evil.

Let us discuss the idea of slavery for a minute. It is true that there was slavery in America, but it was not isolated to just one race. Besides Africans, the Irish were also sold into slavery.

Several years ago I did an internet study on slavery and discovered a number of credible sources confirming the Irish were slaves. It is interesting to note that when I returned to further my research, these sources mysteriously disappeared. Now the left is using censure and propaganda to create the false narrative that only Africans were slaves.

These foundational classes are already beginning to bear fruit at NGBC. At the end of May we started our first Tuesday discipleship class with eight students, including the five means of growth of a disciple. The class has grown to 12 in attendance last night, including several new visitors to the church.

Concurrent with the discipleship class we started a Wednesday night evangelism class, "Share Your Faith", the one day workshop we divided into three parts to serve as an introduction to evangelism, with nine individuals participating.

Lastly, it's really neat to see how the Lord has shown us the fruit of our labor from seeds sown several years ago. For example, Andrew is a man that I met six or seven years ago at KFC when I was driving the food truck for Mission Norman.

"The Power of a Name"

The 1960's was ushered in by the hippie era. Toward the end of that decade, countless hippie couples relocated to the Santa Cruz coast. Settling down they married and had children.

These youngsters didn't have the run of the mill names like John or Mary. The locals became accustomed to their children's playmates having names such as Time Warp, Tranquilla and Revolution.

In due time Whirlwind, Spring Fever and Daydream were old enough to start school.

Each fall doting parents tearfully put name tags on their precious little ones and sent them to their first day of Kindergarten. As far as names go the Kindergarten teachers had seen it all, until one particular year they met their first "Fruit Stand."

Even this one seemed odd to them but they tried to take it all in stride. "Would you like to paint a picture, Fruit Stand?" they suggested.

Later on they asked, "Fruit Stand, would you like some juice and cookies?" Timidly he'd accept their offer. As the first day neared an end, his name didn't seem any stranger than Beth's or Revolution's.

The day passed quickly and time to go home had arrived. The teachers began leading the children out to their buses to go home. "Fruit Stand", his teacher questioned, "do you know which bus you are supposed to ride."

He just stood staring at her with his big brown eyes but did not answer. She wasn't surprised as Fruit Stand hadn't spoken all day. Attributing it to the shyness most new students experience she thought nothing of it

At enrollment the parents had been told to write the name of their child's bus stop on the reverse side of their name tag. His teacher turned his tag over to find out which bus he should ride and there, carefully written, was the word "Andrew."

Names are very important, just ask "Fruit Stand", poor little guy. Your name distinguishes you from others. People associate it with not only what you look like, but possibly your family, your reputation, and your character, and that's just concerning our birth name.

When you are born again and go by the name Christian the stakes become much higher because that name means "Christlike".

Once people hear it they expect you to literally be like Christ! That's a BIG responsibility and calling, one most folks don't give much thought to, much less live up to.

In the Bible the Lord changed a person's name because they had a new identity in Him. For example, in Genesis 17:5, Abram's name meaning "high father" was changed to Abraham "father of multitude"; Sarai's name, "my princess," was changed to Sarah "mother of nations"; Genesis 32:28, Jacob, "supplanter", became, Israel, "having power with God"; and John 1:42, Simon "God has heard" became Peter "rock".

At this point each of these saint's lives were taking a new direction; God had a new mission for them. They were being set aside for His purpose and plans. The same holds true when we take on the name Christian.

Now being like Jesus isn't something we can conjure up on our own; it is the Holy Spirit working in us. Don't get me wrong we still have a substantial part in this.

He can't do His work if we don't yield our lives completely to God, allowing Him to take control of every aspect of our lives and transform us.

Now we can go through (which is a study each of us should diligently undertake) and look at all Christ's characteristics to have a clear

understanding of exactly what we are to emulate. Such knowledge is very important but it is so easy to skim over the list and overlook our shortcomings or deceive ourselves into thinking we possess these qualities.

Reflecting Christ in our life is much more than this. We in affect hang up an "Under New Management" sign. His purpose guides our choices, His spirit controls our moods, and His love directs our conduct.

Remember Jesus faced the same feelings and temptations as we do. He experienced it all and at any point could have chosen to "give in" to all that fleshly pressure, but He didn't. We have in our power to choose too.

"For we have not an high priest which cannot be touched with the feeling of our infirmities; but was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin." Hebrews 4:15

Think for a moment how different our lives and Scripture would be had He chosen what He wanted over God's plan. As He faced the cross, knowing the pain and suffering He was to endure, Luke 22: 41-42, 43, tells us the natural man in Him didn't want to do it.

So great was his anguish He even sweated blood. Yet He chose God's purpose to guide His choices and how very thankful we are that He did. Otherwise we would all be looking forward to eternal hell.

"And he was withdrawn from them about a stone's cast, and kneeled down, and prayed,

their diverse needs.

In a typical class, faculty taught students who physically came to the classroom, but they also taught those who connected remotely to the class via Zoom, or those who took the course in an asynchronous, online manner.

This involved a lot of preparation, and faculty were faced with the difficult task of creating community and promoting learning.

Faculty used many different techniques to accomplish their learning objectives:

- developed extensive content for Canvas, our learning management system,
- 2) utilized state-of-the-art video conferencing technology,
- 3) employed new software and methods to discourage cheating,
- 4) modified teaching to enhance learning, and
- 5) maintained accessibility through Zoom for tutoring and advising.

What did we learn? We learned that we have the means and ability to teach effectively in any modality.

We also discovered that some students are not well-suited for virtual learning. Although the flexibility of online learning can be an advantage for most students, for others, it is too much of a good thing.

They tend to be lax in attendance, procrastinate and fail to submit assignments and tests, or have a poor or non-existent Internet connection.

Despite the challenges, this has been a good year. We learned a lot, both students and faculty, and we thank God for His bountiful blessings!

# "That Reminds Me"

"When I Met Jesus"

One of Ray Boltz's beautiful songs is titled, "Where I Met Jesus." It is the story of an elderly man who went to the altar in church and was saved.

The recurring phrase, "This is where I met Jesus," is given. It has beautiful message, but as I listened to it again the other day, I thought about significance of that.

There was a definite time and place in my life and in the life of every child of God when they met Jesus.

There is a teaching in the religious arena today that salvation develops over a period of time. Something like osmosis. According to them, they were unsaved and began going to church, read the Bible, and did a bunch of good things, and then suddenly they woke up one day to discover they had been saved along the way.

Ray Boltz's song declares a point in time when salvation comes about, but regardless of what the song declares, the Bible is our rule of faith and practice, and IT declares that fact.

Eph 2:8-9 8 For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: 9 Not of works, lest any man should boast.

John 3:18

18 He that believeth on him is not condemned: but he that believeth not is condemned already, because he hath not believed in the name of the only begotten Son of God.

John 5:24

24 Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that heareth my word, and believeth on him that sent me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation; but is passed from death unto life.

I worry about someone who can't put their finger upon a point in time and say, "That is where I met Jesus!" Someone who is truly saved may not be able to give you a calendar date, but they will be able to tell you a point in time when it happened.

I happen to be able to tell you that I was saved on Saturday night, May 10, 1947. I remember the incident very clearly and I remember it was a revival service meeting at Pilgrim Rest

Missionary Baptist Church, Stratford, OK. It was around 8:00pm when I went to the altar and was saved.

However, I remember the date, May 10, because my mother wrote that date in the family Bible. For many years I didn't know he date. I just knew I was saved.

However, when we began attending youth meetings years later, they often sang a song, "Somebody Touched Me." As they went through the days of the week, the ones who were saved on that day would stand. We would sing, "It was on a Sunday, somebody touched me." Everyone who was saved on a Sunday would stand. Then we would sing, "It was on a Monday, somebody touched me."

Everyone saved on a Monday would stand, and so on through all the days of the week. For those of us do didn't remember which day we would sing, "It was on a one day, somebody touched me."

I just got tired of standing on that day, so I checked the family Bible to see what date my mother had written. She had written May 10, 1947. I looked the date up and found it was on a Saturday. So from then on, when we sang that song, I was able to stand on Saturday.

On the other hand, there are those who will tell you when they were saved they saw a blinding light, a ball of fire, or some other such spooky event.

One person told me that. The man I was with said later, "Maybe he did see a ball of fire in his living room." We both knew the man, and had he seen a ball of fire in his living he would have made a hole through the back wall making his exit

When salvation comes, it will be a definite point in time, but it isn't going to be like the light Paul saw on the road to Damascus either. It's more likely to be in the form of a still small voice and a settled peace in your heart.

However it comes, we will be able to say, "It was THERE I met Jesus."

crowding around Him, pulling on his garments, climbing in his lap, and calling His name?

What if He had snapped like we often do and said, "BE QUITE! Quit hanging on me! You are driving me crazy! I never get a minutes peace!"

Sound familiar? How many lives would be damaged and people hurt if He did not allow God's spirit to control His moods? For that matter, in what manner would our lives be affected if we never knew what mood Christ our Mediator might be in when we call upon Him for help?

"Then were there brought unto him little children, that he should put his hands on them, and pray: and the disciples rebuked

But Jesus said, Suffer little children, and

forbid them not, to come unto me: for of such is the kingdom of heaven.

And he laid his hands on them, and departed thence".

What would the outcome have been for the multitudes in Matthew 15:29-30. 32 had Christ not chose for God's love to direct His conduct?

"And Jesus departed from thence, and came nigh unto the sea of Galilee; and went up into a mountain, and sat down

And great multitudes came unto him, having with them those that were lame, blind, dumb, maimed, and many others, and cast them down at Jesus' feet; and he healed them:

Then Jesus called his disciples unto him, and said, I have compassion on the multitude, because they continue with me now three days, and have nothing to eat: and I will not send them away fasting, lest they faint in the way."

Jesus had been there for three days surrounded by people, healing and listening to them. I am sure He was very tired and hungry Himself. How easy it would have been to ignore their needs, after all, hadn't He already done enough by healing them?

That love strengthened, fed, and saved many from possible death.

"And they did all eat, and were filled: and they took up of the broken meat that was left seven baskets full.

Matthew 15:37-38

Taking Christ's name is more than simply the choice of accepting salvation. Being a Christian isn't merely trying to be like Him. It is first and foremost choosing to give Him power over your life minute by minute.

Let's say for one day Jesus became you. He wakes up in your bed; your family becomes His family, goes to your job, your church, and takes over your life completely. The only exception being, circumstances of your life do not change. Your health, finances, problems all remain the same.

We have His mind that we may think as He does and view everything through His eyes.
