“Conditioning For The Mark Of The Beast”

Let me start this article off with the understanding that it is not my intent in writing this to convince the reader to adopt either a pro-vaccine or an anti-vaccine stance.

That is a subject that I am well versed on, but its discussion would detract from the purpose of this article.

I also wish to make it abundantly clear that this “vaccine”, in its current form, does not meet the Biblical criteria for the mark of the beast.

There are, however, some very alarming developments regarding the Covid vaccines that I feel we must consider here.

Currently, in the state of Oklahoma, most schools are not legally allowed to force vaccination for Covid, nor can they require students to mask up.

We are facing a serious dilemma in the workforce, especially in the field of healthcare. People are in danger of losing their jobs if they are not fully vaccinated by certain deadlines.

I find it very interesting that many of those in healthcare have serious concerns and are unwilling to receive the vaccine, even if they lose their jobs. We are being continually told that vaccines are safe and effective, and if we do not get vaccinated, we are basically bad people.

In Revelation 13:16-17 we read, “And he causeth all, both small and great, rich and poor, free and bond, to receive a mark in their right hand, or in their foreheads: And that no man might buy or sell, save he that had the mark, or the name of the beast, or the number of his name.”

So basically if you do not want to starve to death then you will have to receive such a mark to engage in commerce.

Currently, there are calls to keep the unvaccinated out of society, until such time as

they receive the vaccine. It is important to realize a couple things about the Covid vaccines before we go any further.

First, the vaccines are not fully FDA approved, and have had ZERO studies done on the long-term effects. We are not even being properly informed about the short-term effects and the adverse reactions that are occurring.

Second, what about people having the right to choose what is best for them and their families.

In the Declaration of Independence we see the following in the second paragraph: “We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that are among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.”

So we have God given rights, that are not granted by the government, and therefore cannot be taken away. What is very ironic here is the reason our government was created, verses what the government is actually doing.

The second paragraph continues to say...“That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed....”

So, not only is the government not allowed to take away our rights, but it is the governments responsibility to protect our rights.

State governments are intended to be a “failsafe” if you will, to help protect our rights, even against federal government overreach.

The Fourteenth Amendment is very clear on this subject as section 1 clearly reads, “All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States

and of the State wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.”

The state is not authorized to take our rights away and must protect our rights when they are threatened by others. This is why government was created by our founding fathers.

To this end some Republican representatives have sent a letter to Governor Stitt to address this issue. I want to make my position very clear on this matter, there does not need to be a mandate regarding this issue. We need legislative action that carries the full weight of law.

I know people will scream it is private business so they can mandate what they want to their employees. Well consider this, if you are born female, you cannot be discriminated against.

To the best of my knowledge, we are all born vaccine free. If someone wishes to remain that way, what right does anyone have to tell them they have to change.

I believe twenty representatives signed on to this request and they need our help. We need to be calling all our legislators and asking them to sign on for our medical freedom. We need to call the governor and express our concerns.

In Nazi Germany those who were different, the Jews, had to wear a star so they could be identified. Is a vaccine passport any different?

Already certain venues are requiring proof of vaccination before you can enter. What happens when you can no longer enter a grocery store to buy food because you are not vaccinated?

If you are not allowed to work, you will not have the money necessary to take care of the needs of your family. What gives these businesses the right to control you this way,

This includes Lee, the lady from Taiwan that has been attending services, and Jeff and Sue Coles who have been taking on increased leadership roles in the Bible study at food shelter on Monday mornings and some of the discipleship training on Tuesdays when I was in Mexico.

They continue to have a heart for the downtrodden folks here in Norman and which we are very thankful for.



"Wildfire!!!"



Grassfires are frighteningly powerful as we learned first hand on a hot summer day in the 1980's. The girls were at home with their grandparents. Jerry and I were heading home from a trip to town when we saw a huge pillar of smoke in the distance.

"That must be some fire!" Jerry said in awe, but quickly assured me it wasn't near our home. It's on the wrong side of the road, he reasoned.

The old highway we were on wound back and forth. One time the fire appeared to be on left side and fear would rise up in me. Another twist in the road switched it to the right side and I'd give a sigh of relief.

My mother's heart was anxious to say the least! On the last bend before our turn off, we saw the fire was definitely on the side of our land. We turned and were only two miles from the house.

My heart began to beat faster. Jerry continued to assure me it was the wrong direction.

Suddenly our path was banked on either side by walls of flame. I decided it was now time to panic! Fear consumed me. Had it been physically possible, I'd have wedged myself between the dashboard and windshield the rest of the way, as if hoping somehow to urge the van home more quickly.

As soon as we turned into the driveway, I leaped from the car to check on the girls.

The two youngest were standing on the porch, wailing in terror heads pointed to the sky like small coyotes, and clutching a bedraggled stuffed toy long ago christened, Doggy Woggy.

The oldest, always my brave little warrior, was dipping a half soaked gunnysack in a bucket and valiantly beating the small flame creeping toward our home.

I shooed the girls into the house where they turned their energies to prayer.

Pappaw and Granny had hosed down everything possible. Now we stood side by side at the edge of the road waiting, damp gunnysacks in hand to do battle, as the fire roared at us from the other side.

Plants melted, large trees burst into flame and then it happened! A gust of wind sent pieces of red-hot brush

floating our way. In seconds the small flames grew into another raging wall.

As we furiously fought, our faces blackened with soot and our lungs burned from the heat and acrid air around us.

Several hours later, with the help of neighbors, and fire departments from three other cities, the monster was extinguished. We found ourselves exhausted and dazed.

The hungry blaze had consumed a path five miles long and one mile wide. Blessedly no life of man or beast had been lost, and no buildings or homes destroyed.

As we stood gasping for breath, our bodies aching, we surveyed our land. It was depressing.

No patch of green was left untouched. Nothing remained but acres of desolate, black charred earth. Swirls of smoke dotted the land as it continued to smolder.

We learned it was started about four miles away by a farmer welding his gate. A small spark had found opportunity in the dry brittle summer grass.

For days the taste and smell smoke were with us. Daily chores produced shoes that were darkened by the grime, and each of the animals had black legs and bellies.

All looked barren and hopeless. Little fires popped up now and again as if to threaten a repeat performance. I found it hard to believe the land would ever come to life again.

Then one day so unexpectedly, small spots of green appeared. They were a bright contrast against the gloomy terrain.

CBC Adds Two New Degrees; Presents Academic Awards

New Business Degrees

Central Baptist College has recently added two new degree emphases to our existing Bachelor of Business Administration degree. Beginning Fall of 2021, Business Information Systems and Business Analytics will be available in both Traditional and PACE programs.

Business Information Systems will allow CBC to expand its academic focus in information technology beyond management information systems. The degree will allow the forecasting and predicting of operational needs using research techniques and data analysis for business organizations and their performances.

This degree will prepare students to use their Christian faith, problem solving skills, and love for technology to discover, analyze, and evaluate businesses.

Further, CBC graduates would be able to help businesses align objectives and goals using their knowledge of computer software and understanding of business concepts.

Business Analytics will focus on expanding our information technology programs into data analytics. This extension would allow CBC the opportunity to venture into operational effectiveness using research techniques and data analysis.

This degree will focus on helping students develop unique technical and analytical skills to allow them jobs in a variety of fields.

According to Steve Elder, Director of PACE and Online studies at CBC, "What makes these degrees appealing is that each one uniquely teaches students to recognize how business concepts married with technology aid data-driven businesses with decision making."

I pray God continues to bless the BMA of Oklahoma and its' leaders.

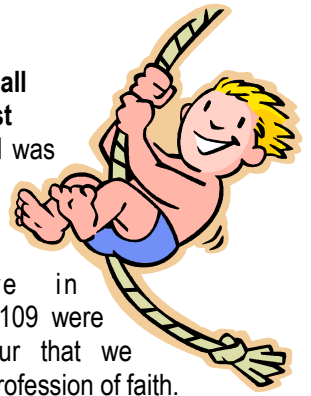

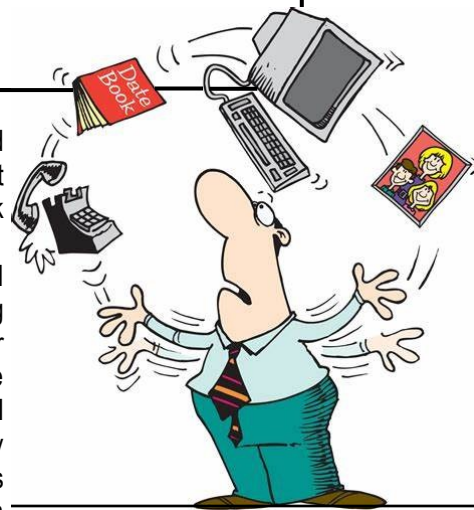

Lastly, the darkened soil is warmed more quickly by the sun so the plants grow faster and earlier. Our hearts tend to warm up pretty fast to God in our times of darkness.

No wonder we experience such great spiritual growth during a crisis!

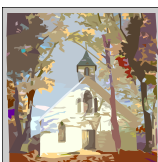

When we allow others to determine what is best and dictate to us what we are allowed to do we have become enslaved. Even if you personally believe everyone should be vaccinated, what gives anyone the right to force that supposition on everyone?

Already, we have people who believe Christianity is dangerous because of its views towards homosexuality and they feel it should be outlawed. They believe it would be for society's greater good to not allow Christianity to exist.

According to CNN the following companies are requiring Covid vaccinations for at least
