"By mercy and truth iniquity is purged: and by the fear of the LORD men depart from evil. When a man's ways please the LORD, he maketh even his enemies to be at peace with him. Better is a little with righteousness than great revenues without right.

A man's heart deviseth his way: but the LORD directeth his steps. A divine sentence is in the lips of the king: his mouth transgresseth not in judgment.

A just weight and balance are the LORD'S: all the weights of the bag are his work. It is an abomination to kings to commit wickedness: for the throne is established by righteousness." Proverbs 16:6-12

"Where is our society standing today?" is the question that we should be asking. People must understand that we are accountable for our own actions.

Since we are accountable to God for ourselves, we must have the ability to choose how we live. The decisions we make must be our own decisions. As we face the prospect of encroachment on our civil liberties, we must understand the dangers our loss of freedom would entail.

The Fourteenth Amendment Section 1

All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

We see it is the responsibility of the states to ensure that the liberties of individuals are protected. Our founding fathers recognized that all people are endowed or granted certain rights.

In the Declaration of Independence we see the following: "We hold these

truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.--That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed," Government was created to protect our rights, not to grant them.

Therefore, since government did not grant our rights, it cannot take them away.

We must allow the Spirit to lead us in the paths that we must go. Galatians 5:16-17 tells us, "This I say then, Walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfill the lust of the flesh. For the flesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh: and these are contrary the one to the other: so that ye cannot do the things that ye would."

We should not get our marching orders from the world, or the things of the world. We should be living in obedience to the Holy Spirit of God. As we are constantly bombarded to change the way we do

"Progressive Defeat"

"Enthusiasm is very important in sports, but also in the spiritual realm. It will often determine our victory or our defeat."

Our granddaughter was playing in the finals of a soccer tournament. Stephanie's team had defeated the three previous teams 5-0, 5-0 and 1-0.

The new opposing team in this game took the field with enthusiasm. However, with the first few minutes, Stephanie's team scored the first goal.

Quickly, they followed with four more. At the end of the first period the score was nine to zero. They called the game because by that time the final outcome was obvious. The idea is to defeat, not destroy, the opponent.

What impressed me most was the obvious progressive loss of enthusiasm in the opposing team. The first goal affected them, but each successive goal brought a further downward spiral.

By the third goal the opposing team put forth almost no effort. After they fourth goal they were defeated.

Stephanie's team went on to win the tournament. When I think back on the day, that game was the one I remember.

I recall one such game from my school days. I was in the seventh grade at Byford, a country school. Although I didn't really like to play basketball, not playing wasn't an option.

We needed every boy on the boy's team and every girl on the girl's team, or there would be no teams. We had no substitutes for either the boys or girls. Every student was on a team.

Byford didn't provide uniforms and the parents didn't have money to buy any, so

we each used our own t-shirts with our number hand-sewn on the back. No shorts, just regular school clothes for bottoms.

Our team consisted of a third grader up through an eighth grader. We were a strange looking team and subjected to ridicule by everyone. We usually played as hard as we could, but almost always got beat.

We had been playing the country schools, but were scheduled to play Stratford, the town team. They were undefeated for the season, so we figured we would be defeated. However, Mr. Evans gave us a pep talk to do our best.

The night of the game came and we took to the court. Snickers came not only from the opposing team, but also from many of the adult spectators from Stratford. They were enjoying the motley appearance of our team.

I sensed a growing anger among my Byford teammates, but also the contempt of the Stratford team as they put in their second string against us. We were fuming by then.

Byford hit the court with a vengeance and overwhelmed Stratford's second string within minutes. The Stratford coach quickly put in the first string, but it was too late.

We were on a roll and also routed them with basket after basket. We handed the Stratford Bulldogs their first defeat of the season.

Stratford went on to win the rest of the season, and Byford went back to our "win some, lose some," season.

Attitude made the difference in the Stratford-Byford game by both parties.

Enthusiasm is very important in sports, but also in the spiritual realm. It will often determine our victory or our defeat.
