

McGirt v. Oklahoma "The State We Are In....Or Not"

One of the most troubling developments we are facing in the state of Oklahoma is the fallout that is associated with this Supreme Court Decision. (18-9526 McGirt v. Oklahoma (07/09/2020)- Supreme court.) I recommend that all residents of Oklahoma become familiar with this as soon as possible. At issue is whether or not tribal reservations were dissolved when Oklahoma became a state.

In writing this article I want to make it clear that in no way am I, or the BMA of Oklahoma, trying to be condescending or judgmental toward any group or groups of people. In fact, quite the opposite is true.

"But if ye have respect to persons, ye commit sin, and are convinced of the law as transgressors." James2:9

We believe all should be treated equally in the eyes of God, and we all become one at salvation.

"There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither bond nor free, there is neither male nor female: for ye are all one in Christ Jesus." Galatians 3:28

The ultimate goal is to see unification of all believers in Christ Jesus.

Now let us try to gain an understanding of the implications of the above-mentioned ruling (will be referred to as McGirt through the rest of the article). At the heart of the matter is whether reservations still exist and who ultimately has jurisdiction and authority over eastern Oklahoma.

Understand that not all of the tribes have

the same opinion on this matter. Also, different individuals within tribal iurisdictions have varied

opinions on this matter.

I have spoken to one native who believes that Oklahoma does not exist east of I-35 and that all people living on tribal lands should pay taxes to the nation they live in. This would mean that I would pay taxes

to the Cherokee nation, and would be a resident of that nation, but I would not be a member.

McGirt primarily dealt with the jurisdiction of crimes, but how would it influence the ownership of property? Can a nonnative own property in the area of question?

Since Oklahoma became a state, all citizens have been legally allowed to own property, and the jurisdiction has been under the state. The current question is, "Is my land part of Oklahoma, or does it lie within or on a reservation."? Furthermore, what role does the federal constitution play in this matter, particularly the 14th amendment?

"Section 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws."

These details have not presently been fully addressed and are cause for concern. For instance, why would a company want to buy land and invest in the development if there is a possibility, albeit remote, that they will lose ownership of that property?

There are problems that we currently face because of the McGirt decision. We have heard that criminals were allowed to go free from jail because they were natives, and their convictions took place in a state court rather than tribal or federal.

On November 16, 1907, President Theodore Roosevelt signed legislation

combining the Oklahoma Territory and the Indian Territory making Oklahoma the 46th state.

Some natives challenge the authority of the statehood of Oklahoma, saying reservations should still exist. Other people feel that if an Indian sold, or "legally" gave up his land, it is

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no longer part of a reservation.

This is a very divisive issue that determines which entity has authority in legal matters. For instance, if there is a dispute (criminal) between two non-natives then the state has jurisdiction.

If it is between two tribal members, the tribe has jurisdiction, or perhaps federal. If the crime involves a native and a nonnative, then it becomes a federal issue.

So does the federal government apply federal law? Or does it apply state law? Do the tribal laws apply?

Neither the federal government, nor the Tribes currently have the infrastructure to handle such an influx of cases. Unless the crime is of a very serious nature, many that would have been handled by the state are never prosecuted.

This means there is no justice for the victims, and it could possibly embolden the criminals. I have heard an estimate that in some counties as much as 95 percent of crimes involving tribal members are not being prosecuted.

Healthy Church Solutions _____ By Larry Barker Reality Check: Thinking Correctly

How about a reality check?

What's your attitude like? Would you describe yourself right now as full of hope and excitement, or are you full of despair and discouragement?

Maybe you're allowing all that activity to rob you of the ability to worship? (Remember Mary and Martha and the lesson Mary learned?) What are you focused on, thinking through, and meditating about the most?

Paul says in 1 Thessalonians 5:8, "But since we belong to the day, we must be serious and put the armor of faith and love on our chests, and put on a helmet of the hope of salvation."

This is especially important right now as things seem to be growing progressively dimmer!

Are you focused on the hope of your salvation? What happens when that is the first thought of every day?

Jesus gives you a keen awareness of and gratitude for your deliverance from the bondage of sin and your ability to live a pure and God-pleasing life.

If you have recently found yourself griping too much, it's possible you're not praising Him enough. The hope of your salvation gives you a deep understanding that sin can destroy your health, your relationships, and the ability to fulfill your purpose, so you must remain focused on the Savior.

This laser beam of intentional concentration enables you to have deep compassion for those who need a Savior and need to experience what you have in Christ!

Intentionality also makes you quicker to witness, give thanks, offer praise for your Savior, and intercede for others.

This is the real battleground on which

the enemy fights his strongest, dirtiest, bloodiest, and most important battles. Consider this: Jesus is Savior and His work in us is salvation.

There is tremendous benefit in meditating on His loving-kindness and His death on the cross, so you might live free of sin and inherit an eternal home.

Reality check number one is that no one can govern or monitor your thinking but you. You control and govern what you will allow your mind to dwell on. You have the power to both dismiss and entertain thoughts.

Paul makes it clear that we are to pursue having the mind of Christ. His attitude. If you allow wrong thinking to control you, before long it becomes a stronghold and will end up characterizing your attitude toward life.

Tony Evans says, "If it becomes a stronghold it is because you either do not know the truth or are not making use of the truth you know."

Reality check number two is that you can have even have victory in your mind and your thinking. Easier said than done, but Paul would not have made the challenge if it were not possible through the work of the Holy Spirit in our hearts and minds.

What is the most important thought to remain focused upon? That Jesus is your Lord and Savior. Salvation does not only refer to a person's initial acceptance of Christ, but also to God's ongoing rescuing and delivering power.

This is why you are instructed by the Savior to pray daily, "Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from the evil one."

Reality check number three is that how you think usually determines how you function. The helmet protects the head where the brain is the control center for all we do.

Protect your thought life by trusting God to save, rescue, and deliver you from the onslaught of messages you encounter every day.

God desires to save you from all doubt and deliver you from the enemy's lies. This onslaught is meant to rob you of joy, peace, security, and confidence.

Second Corinthians 10:4-5 says, "We demolish arguments and every highminded thing that is raised up against the knowledge of God, taking every thought captive to obey Christ."

Reality check number four is that the helmet of salvation is what protects you from discouragement. The enemy tempts you to give up when you don't see the results you desired.

You prayed but God did not answer it the way you had hoped.

You poured your life into a ministry and yet it did not grow and flourish.

You discipled someone countless hours but they did not continue on the path you believed they should. The temptation is to lose heart.

You begin to wonder if you have labored in vain as the enemy whispers into your ear that you are a failure.

Remember that he is a liar and God has called you to be faithful.

Reality check number five is if the enemy can discourage you, he will then deter you. Discouragement comes from looking at your failures, sins, unresolved problems, poor health, or anything else negative in your life causing you to lose confidence in the loving care of your heavenly Father.

You begin to doubt His promises, goodness, and dependability. Do not forget you are in a race you cannot lose and a fight where you are guaranteed victory.

The helmet of salvation gives us confidence and assurance that our present struggles won't last forever!

Reality check . . . in Christ you are on the winning team.

"Six Things to Stop Doing"

Leading your church in being a healthy and growing congregation of believers means that you must stop doing certain things.

While there are many "must dos" there are also many "must don'ts" that require honest evaluation. They are things that, if you continue to practice them, will cause you and your church to remain plateaued or even headed in a downward death spiral.

Refusing to stop doing these things could very well lead you to a place where you will crash and burn . . . emotionally, spiritually, and physically.

Stop ignoring the importance of your quiet time and building your personal intimacy with Christ

A.W. Tozer said, "God doesn't have favorites, but He does have intimates." If you are not careful you will know a lot about God but not really know Him personally. What are you doing to ensure that your personal relationship with your heavenly Father is close, intimate, and vibrantly alive?

There is a huge difference between having knowledge of God and having a deep relationship with God. Do you know more about Him than you actually know Him personally?

Stop talking about prayer and pray

It is a discipline that takes a lot of time and dedication to develop but is well worth the journey.

Bill Elliff, in *Simply Prayer*, reminds us of the need to begin prayer with adoration, "Our Father who is in heaven, hallowed be your name."

Are you worshiping Him daily? Are you slowing down long enough to focus on His presence? While there, what are you noticing about who He is and how He operates?

Bill says, "Don't rush this moment in prayer. It will set the tone for the rest of your praying. Let a vision of God fill your soul and direct your praise."

Stop deciding what you will do each day

Bill Bright used to lay his calendar before the Lord every morning and ask Him what needed to be removed and what needed to be added. He sought to make sure that everything was run through the filter of obeying the Great Commission.

We should also pray, "Your kingdom come, your will be done in earth as it is in Heaven." Every day should begin by focusing on aligning with God's purpose for you and for that day.

Stop striving to get God to do what you want through persuading Him to bless what you have planned.

Bill Elliff reminds us that Jesus listened to His Father in heaven and did only what the Father initiated. Planning is important and calendars are good but we must remain sensitive to the leading and prompting of the Holy Spirit.

Jesus made it clear that He could do nothing of His own initiative. Are you living by divine initiation? If you are not careful, you can schedule God's divine interruptions right out of your day because it was not on your calendar.

It is good to be goal and time driven, but it is even better to take your goals and your calendar and allow them to be controlled by the Holy Spirit.

Stop believing your critics

Yes, everyone has them and unfortunately, they impact us far more than we like to admit. If we are looking for our sense of worth and accomplishments in what others say, there will always be the temptation to allow the praise to corrupt us and the criticism to crush us.

One of the enemy's greatest weapons is words of accusation. Satan is the accuser of the brethren (Revelation 12:10), and it brings him great joy when someone allows him to use them as his spokesman.

Words do hurt, and accusatory words

can be vicious either in nature or in the way they are said.

Stop trying to do it by yourself

In Exodus 18:17-18 Moses was trying to handle everything himself and received some very wise counsel. "What you're doing is not good," Moses' father-in-law said to him. "You will certainly wear out both yourself and these people who are with you, because the task is too heavy for you. You can't do it alone."

Great advice because exhaustion and burn out are real if you do not find some margin in your life. It is easy to just keep saying yes and doing more and more and more, but you must begin saying no to some things is order to say yes to others.

Maybe you want others to help, but right now there just isn't anyone available. First, usually there is someone. Realize that you can burn the candle at both ends for a season, but you cannot sustain that pace forever. Begin praying for God to raise up leaders out of the harvest and begin pouring into them and training them.

If you do not have someone to oversee and direct that ministry, maybe you don't need it. That is hard, but it is better to do a few things well than to do many things poorly.

Do you have a discipleship pathway that leads into a leadership pipeline?

Stop wondering if there is any hope for your church

As long as Jesus is on His throne and at work, there is always hope. Your labor is not in vain. John Maxwell said, "Where there is not hope in the future, there is not power in the present."

Remember, just because you cannot see the way does not mean that God doesn't have a way for you and your church.

There is power in the present and real hope when you place a radical trust in God that includes a candid admission that you do not know the details of the future.

What you do know - that He is God - far outweighs what you do not know.
