

"Political Games, Resulting Shames"

Here we go again, the legislative session in the state of Oklahoma seems to be another drama filled mess. It seems as though politics is more and more becoming a game that must be played. I believe that ideals and principles should be the norm, not hurt feelings. We need statesmen not politicians.

Wikipedia makes the following distinction, " A statesman or a stateswoman is a respected, skilled and experienced political leader or figure. In most respects a statesman is the opposite of a politician. Politicians are thought of as people who will say or do anything to get elected or to gain power."

Nowadays we see chronologically mature people who are emotionally and behaviorally acting like they should be wearing diapers and drinking from a bottle. Everyone should look to the merits of proposed legislation, and not use leverage and favoritism as a basis for decision making.

Too often the decision to pass or fail a bill is based upon who the author is, and who may support it. It is a shame that the author and co-authors must be considered prior to submitting a bill.

Integrity should be the word for the season; however, it seems good people are often misled because pertinent information is withheld. I understand the idea in sales, putting the best forward and minimizing the bad to make the "sale", but withholding important information is unethical.

In Mayes County Oklahoma we are indeed facing a dilemma that could very well negatively affect the entire state.

I want to share some scriptures as they are pertinent to this discussion.

James 2:9 tells us, "But if ye have respect to persons, ye commit sin, and are convinced of the law as transgressors."

I know this verse is referring to those coming into an assembly and showing partiality. The principle is quite clear, we should treat people with equal regard.

Ecclesiastes 12:14 says, "For God shall bring every work into judgment, with every secret thing, whether it be good, or whether it be evil."

Proverbs 18:13, "He that answereth a matter before he heareth it, it is a folly and shame unto him,".

Now let us look at the TIF, Tax Increment Financing, that is being proposed to bring in a large business into the Mid America Industrial Park in Mayes County. The "idea" is that we should use public tax revenue to subsidize a large corporation to entice this company to come here.

Now the local TIF would potentially affect Mayes County in several ways. First, we must consider how returning 100 million dollars in tax revenue to a private company would impact Mayes County.

It gives an unfair advantage to a new

company allowing them to potentially be able to outcompete pre existing businesses.

They would have reduced expenses and therefore could potentially be able to offer incentives to attract workers. This could hurt businesses that have been a part of our community for decades, potentially causing us to lose these businesses.

> We must next consider the reason we have taxes is to support the needed infrastructure that goes along with the growth. The roads will be affected as will schools in the community.

Only receiving a portion of the revenue, and that

being spread over time, will not adequately provide us with our needs. This will leave us lacking in important areas and possibly leading us to locate other sources of revenue, i.e. new taxes.

So how does this affect us at the state level, you may ask? As more and more taxes are diverted back to private businesses and away from infrastructure and other needs, the ability to fund needed projects decreases. As shortfalls arise, the money has to come from elsewhere.

I have heard that the state may offer as much as \$1.3 Billion in incentives to this unknown company.

Since when is it the responsibility of the government to dictate and control which companies succeed or fail. How is it fair to subsidize some companies, and not others, all with money that is diverted from its original purpose.

Right now the states of Kansas and Oklahoma are in a bribing war to attract a specific business.

As was mentioned by a representative of the Mid America Industrial Park, the company code named "Ocean" is coming to be a supplier of Canoo, a yet unproven electric car manufacturer.

"A Prayer Answered"

"Be careful for nothing; but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving let your request be made known to God."

A while back I was clearing out some of the old files, reports, etc on my computer hard drive. I ran across an article I had written about prayers. I had intended to include it in the weekly bulletin articles, but it hadn't made it.

Apparently, like the "Lost Episodes of Bonanza," it was hidden away awaiting my discovery.

It was dated January 5, 1997, which would have been my first Sunday as pastor of Highland Park. That was a long time ago, but the message is still very appropriate and worth sharing.

It was Christmas day 1996 and I was driving south on I-35. The speed limit was 70mph. That's as fast as I wanted to drive so I had my cruise control set.

Most cars passed me at several miles above the speed limit. That's not unusual for a holiday, and is one of the main reasons there are more traffic fatalities on holidays.

My slower speed made me feel like Maude Frickett on a Los Angeles freeway from the old.

Suddenly, I saw an old Pontiac coming up very fast behind me. He was in the fast lane and I was in the slow lane, but I estimated his speed to be well over 100mph.

As the car sailed by, I saw there was a woman beside the male driver and two young children in the back seat.

The driver had his left hand draped casually over the top of the steering wheel. With his right hand he held a beer tilted up to his mouth. I shuttered to realize the jeopardy he was placing his family, as well as everyone else on the road.

Unbelievably, the woman, obviously the mother of the children appeared unconcerned.

The children were too young to realize their danger and were playing and bouncing in the back.

As the car disappeared over the next hill, I whispered a prayer, "Lord, please protect those children."

I crested the hill and was startled to see a large splash area in the fast lane. The trail of water led to the rear of the old Pontiac in the distance.

Steam was pouring from under the hood of the car. The old Pontiac was slowing and coasting to the shoulder. A radiator hose had obviously broken, disabling the car.

Due to his speed when the hose broke, it took a distance to get stopped. The car was coming to a stop as I passed. I didn't stop. The walk or wait for help would do the driver good.

I was glad his hose had broken and disabled the car. Now he couldn't kill or injure those children with his drinking and driving.

My first thought was, "It serves you right!" However, as I thought more about it, I was startled to realize it was exact and almost immediate answer to my whispered prayer when the car passed me. "Lord, please protect those children."

Undoubtedly, some would discount this incident as being a coincidence. They might say the fast driving put extra pressure on an old rotten water hose causing it to break.

They might be right. However, isn't it strange that it just happened to break only seconds after I uttered the prayer?

What a great God we serve! He answers small, as well as large prayers.
