“How High Should We Go?”

Oklahoma State Question 820 would make it legal for persons in Oklahoma over the age of 21 to use marijuana recreationally.

Currently, medical marijuana is available with a doctor's prescription in Oklahoma.

Genesis 1:29-30 KJV tells us, “And God said, Behold, I have given you every herb bearing seed, which is upon the face of all the earth, and every tree, in which is the fruit of a tree yielding seed; to you it shall be meat. And to every beast of the earth, and to every fowl of the air, and to every thing that creepeth upon the earth, wherein there is life, I have given every green herb for meat: and it was so.”

The purpose of this discussion is not to revisit whether medical marijuana is acceptable or not. Some may try to use Scripture to justify the use of alcohol, which is another mind altering substance, to say marijuana is okay.

Proverbs 31:6 tells us, “Give strong drink unto him that is ready to perish, and wine unto those that be of heavy hearts.

1 Timothy 5:23 says, “Drink no longer water, but use a little wine for thy stomach's sake and thine often infirmities.”

So the use of medicine, in the case when alcohol is used as medicine, it is okay. We must note the we have many medicines available and do not necessarily need to use alcohol as such.

My issue is focused on the recreational use.

As a Christian I am 100 percent opposed to using any mind altering substance recreationally.

The question is what do I believe I should do as a citizen. I do not like to impose my will on other individuals, choosing to not infringe upon other people's rights.

I do believe marijuana use, at the recreational level, will hurt our society. As I live in post medical marijuana Oklahoma, I have noticed that irresponsible use has had an effect on me.

It is legal, as far as I can determine, to have a licensed grow anywhere they want with little exception. Also, there are very few restrictions on the locations of dispensaries.

Furthermore, the smoking of this substance is very uncomfortable when it is in close proximity to me. How can you restrict someone from using their prescribed medication when and how they see fit.

Smelling the smoke emitted from the smoking makes my stomach upset as well as can cause breathing difficulties. The grow that is near my home seemingly makes me feel ill.

When I did some internet research, I



discovered that the health side effects of living close to a commercial grow were consistent with some of my ailments.

There are times when I go visit family in another state, and there is not a grow close by. Coincidentally, I have noticed that I feel better after being away for several days.

The point I am trying to make is that them exercising their “right” effects my health in an adverse way. There was very little forethought before the legislation

took effect regarding specifics that needed to be addressed prior to the legalization of medical marijuana.

There are multitudes of other problems we are facing in Oklahoma Regarding marijuana use.

Children are bringing gummies from home that have THC, the hallucinogenic chemical in marijuana, and distributing them amongst their peers.

The standards which allow for consistent dosing is seriously lacking with this drug. The regulatory issues are having serious impacts on both those who use and those who are around those who use.

I cannot tell you how many times

"The Good Samaritan"

Most students of the Bible are familiar with the story of the Good Samaritan in Like 10:25-37, but let me refresh our memories to bring us to some decisions in our personal lives.

Jesus and a lawyer are in discussion and the lawyer asked Jesus what one must do to inherit eternal life, to which Jesus asked him, "What is written in the law?"

The lawyer replied from the OT, *Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul and with all thy strength and with all thy mind; and thy neighbor as thyself.*"

Jesus said, "do this and thou shall live."

But the lawyer asked Jesus who his neighbor was and this prompted Jesus to share the story of the Good Samaritan; how that a man was beaten, robbed, and left for dead on the side of the road.

A priest and a Levite both passed by and saw the injured man but failed to

render aid. Then the Good Samaritan came by, rendered aid, took the injured man to town and lodged him in an inn, promising to pay any additional expenses upon his return through the city.

After Jesus shared the story, He asked the lawyer, *Which of these three, thinketh thou, was neighbor to him that fell among thieves?*" and the lawyer said, "He that showed mercy on him. Then Jesus said unto him, *Go and do thou likewise.*"



Because the Samaritan was hated by the Jews because of his ethnicity, Jesus shows that racial considerations are utterly transcended by God's command to love Him and thus to love others as He does, without prejudice or partiality.

We are facing racial/political hatred in America today. It is not likely that we will come face to face with the

protesters of other cities here in Wynnewood or in your community, but we surely must be in serious prayer for the communities who are faced with such violence and prejudices.

It's natural for us to "pick sides" politically but let us ever be ready to "love our neighbor" in the manner in which God has before us.

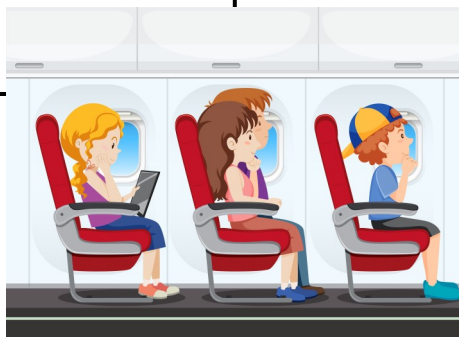
In our limited understanding we sometimes think our location makes us nearer or further from God. Nothing could be further from the truth!

"Locating a Cemetery"

My cousin had died and they were having a graveside service in the Tuttle Cemetery. I wasn't quite sure where the Tuttle Cemetery was located. I had handled my uncle's funeral and he was buried there in 1974, which was 31 years earlier.

Another cousin called wanting to ride with me to the cemetery. I agreed, but was a little puzzled by his request since he lived almost as far from me as he did from the cemetery.

When asked why he said he had been to the cemetery for our Aunt Dora's burial, but he couldn't remember exactly how to get to it.

I advised him that she had died in 1955 which was 50 years earlier. He laughed and said that was probably the reason he couldn't remember how to get there.

On the day of the services I drove all the way through town without seeing any signs on the highway for the Tuttle Cemetery. Ladies, believe it or not, I stopped and asked directions and the store clerk directed me right to it.

However, upon arrival I was surprised to find there is not Tuttle Cemetery. The actual name of the cemetery in Tuttle is "Fairlawn." When I was told the services were to be graveside they said it was in the Tuttle Cemetery. The clerk who directed me to it didn't correct me about the name.

However, when I arrived at the cemetery I was surprised to see the name over the entry gate was "Fairlawn Cemetery."

But this is not unique to Tuttle. Most cemeteries do not bear the name of the town where they are located. Amazingly, many have some peaceful name attached to them, many times with "lawn" as part of the name. That's probably to

make it sound more peaceful for the loved one who has departed.

Regardless of the name on the cemetery gate, the cemetery is a place where the dead are buried.

I'm sure many are like my cousin and I about the Tuttle Cemetery. Although we had been there before, neither of us could remember how to get to it.

There are a lot of cemeteries in the world, so I wondered how many cemeteries are unknown to anyone, even in the community where they are located.



To document the location of all the cemeteries in the world be an unimaginable, if not impossible task. A computer could contain the information once assembled and entered, but what human could gather all that information?

Yet God not only knows where all the cemeteries are, but also where all the graves are.

In John 5:28-29 Jesus said, "...the hour is coming, in the which all that are in the graves shall hear his voice. And shall come forth; they that have done good, unto the resurrection of life; and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation."

vehicles have travelled past me on or near the road and the smell was overpowering. There have been times the smell was sickening, even though the windows were closed.

This puts lives in danger, those who are passengers as well as other drivers who share the roads.

We have foreigners who illegally own these grows and it is very difficult due to current laws to regulate the industry.

I will vote no on State Question 820. Please vote no on March 7, 2023.
