1 Timothy 6:10 is a verse that explains much about our current society.

"For the love of money is the root of all evil: which while some coveted after, they have erred from the faith, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows."

I was mortified. Although I didn't know what the word meant, I certainly knew how it felt!

The teacher continued to laugh as she resumed the class. I despised her for that and never drew anything else for her again.

Later Lola Sargent, one of my classmates. was

trying to draw a picture of a train. I don't remember wyy, but she asked me to help her.

I drew a train and let her use it as a pattern. She told me how good it was. When I took my train picture home my patents both were really impressed by it.

Encouraged, I started drawing a lot of other pictures, but never for our teacher. If we had an assignment requiring any art I had Lola do the drawing for me and turned it in as mine. While she was drawing mine I drew one for her and she turned it in as hers.

I've thought a lot about this incident

over the years. I don't know what went on in the mind of the thoughtless teacher

who would laugh at the sincere efforts of a nine year old boy and then compound the error by holding him up for ridicule by his peers.

In Galatians 6:7 the Bible clearly tells us we reap what we sow, so I can hardly imagine

the embarrassment that teacher faced somewhere later in life.

However, I'm just as certain the teacher probably considered the incident so insignificant she probably gave it no thought when the payback came upon her.

### Gracious News From Grace Harbor

We had a really exciting month in March. Two weeks ago, we had our first covenant membership class for 2023 and had 19 attend who wanted to hear more about Grace Harbor.

We anticipate most of those to take the next step of formally joining. We will have personal meetings with many of them over the next couple of weeks to hear about their desire to join, their testimony of coming to faith, and their baptism.

From there, we will bring those who join in front of our church body to welcome them, followed by a time of worship and lunch together on a Family Sunday.

That evening, Grace Harbor was the host location for a local "Nowruz" celebration. Nowruz is the Persian New Year, and many of our Afghan Refugee neighbors celebrate this.

We have a Christian Afghan family in our community who decided that a good way to minister to these Muslim neighbors would be to invite them to this celebration. There were about 40 Muslim neighbors with us that night: men, women, and children. There was a great, authentic, Afghan meal.

More importantly, our Christian Afghan Brother preached a message from Psalm 19 to a captive audience. The end of Psalm 19 speaks of the great redeemer, and our brother shared clearly a Gospel message about this redeemer- that salvation is only through him.

Evangelizing and Ministering to Muslims who have never heard this Gospel message is much different than many of the methods that are utilized in a culture where there is at least slight awareness, so it was very much a seed-planting evening.

We are confident in the Gospel's power to save, and are praying for the Lord to save!
