

"O Preacher, O Preacher, Where For Art Thou Preacher?"

In writing this, please note that I am not referring to specific churches, or anyone in particular. In fact, I will be using generalities that are prevalent most everywhere.

I want it to be clear that we are facing a true dilemma, one that without resolution will result in a decline in the effectiveness of Christianity. Our churches are in trouble, and with that, God's message to the world is becoming very limited. It is very easy to throw blame around, but what we need to do is to identify the problem and work to resolve it.

The issue at hand for this article is the lack of solid pastors and preaching.

Hebrews 13:7 tells us, "Remember them which have the rule over you, who have spoken unto you the word of God: whose faith follow, considering the end of their conversation."

Have no misunderstanding about that which I am going to say, we are to follow a pastor's faith, as they follow God. So, "whose faith follow' is absolutely appropriate, but never does it say, "whose faith exploit."

There are many who are called who are not in the ministry because of what they have seen, and/or experienced.

I am thinking about one young man who confessed that God had placed a call upon his life. He absolutely refused to answer such a call because, as he testified, he did not want to put his family through what mine had to go through.

The sad thing is he was referring to how my family had been mistreated by churches. To be clear, this happened prior to me coming to Oklahoma.

When we look at the struggles that face ministers today, we cannot help but be in shock. We expect the world to be at war with biblical Christianity, but what many do not see is how much preachers and their families are attacked by those who are supposedly Christians.

Matthew 7:21 tells us, "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven: but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven."

This tells me that just because someone is in church, claiming to be a Christian, does not mean it is so. Men do not answer the call because of the mean-spirited people in churches today.

Others have left the ministry because of the damage inflicted by those who were supposed to be allies. Many people ask, "Why don't we have

enough preachers? I sit by surprised that there are as many left that have not given up.

What are some battles that face preachers today? Well, there are many, but I will deal with some areas that I've noticed.

The common denominator in all of these scenarios is that the minister is so overwhelmed that his ministry loses its effectiveness.

I understand that some churches are small, and that they are limited in the support that they can offer a pastor. The question is, are they doing their best?

The more a pastor has to work means less time in the ministry, less time with family and less energy.

Pastors are susceptible to burnout and fatigue. Pastors are expected to make sacrifices that affect him and his family.

The million-dollar question is, how many of the church members are willing to make the same sacrifices, or any sacrifices at all? Would you be comfortable and content with what you expect the pastor to live on?

Another important question is how much help does the church give to the pastor?

Exodus 17:11-12 tells us, "And it came to pass, when Moses held up his hand, that Israel prevailed: and when he let down his hand, Amalek prevailed. But Moses hands were heavy, and they took a stone, and put it under him, and he sat thereon; and Aaron and Hur stayed up his hands, the one on the one side, and the other on the other side; and his hands were steady until the going down of the sun."

Moses could not do it alone, he needed help. Why do we expect the pastor to be able to do everything alone and without assistance? Successful pastors have Aarons and Hurs that help them. Without rest and assistance God's man will experience fatigue, and battles will be lost.

Sadly, instead of helping pastors on the battlefield, many betray him and actually fight against the pastor. Many times the pastor becomes a referee, making sure supposedly mature Christians can peacefully coexist.

With no one to watch his back the pastor has to stay ever alert and never

Then again in verse 42, He Prayed, "O Father, if this cup may not pass away from me, except I drink it, thy will be done."

Jesus was totally surrendered to the will of His Father, even unto death. Jesus is our example for all of life and here He is our example to be fully surrendered to His Father's will.

When we get to that level of commitment in our lives, even unto our death, as Jesus did, we will experience our Father's richest of blessings.

Opportunities For Barnabas Touch Teams Pastors, Come Be A Part of a Barnabas Touch Team Today

And the things that thou hast heard of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also.

2 Timothy 2:2 (KJV)

What is Barnabas Touch? Barnabas Touch is the teaching and training ministry of Evangelistic International Ministries.

It began over 20 years ago and was led by the late Larry Markum. Bro. Larry, who had served as a BMAA interstate missionary, had a heart to help international church planters and pastors have a better understanding of Baptist doctrine, sermon preparation and study, and church policy, as well.

After Bro. Larry's passing, Barnabas Touch was then led by Bro. Danny Bullock.

Beginning in 2014, and under the leadership of Bro. Danny, EIM focused on the country of Tanzania. EIM began leading three teams a year to Tabora, Tanzania and partnered with the BMAA Seminary in Jacksonville, Texas to train and teach 22 Tanzanian pastors.

As President of the BMAA Seminary, Dr. Charley Holmes traveled several times to help in teaching Baptist doctrine, evangelism, and what it means to be associational in practice.

Bro. Phil Knott, who was serving at the time as the Africa Coordinator for BMAA Global Missions, as well as 17 other BMAA pastors, taught with us in teaching classes such as church planting, Old and New Testament survey, a study of the Pauline Epistles, the BMAA Doctrinal Statement, sermon prep and how to study the Bible.

In the Spring of 2018, we completed our training with each student having received 150 hours of Biblical study. At the end of our 3½ years of teaching and training, the BMAA Seminary gave each pastor a certificate of completion. This certificate has been recognized by the Tanzanian Government as a certification of a higher education.

EIM has been asked by BMAA Global Missions to replicate in Ghana, Africa what we had done in Tanzania. Our Barnabas Touch team to Ghana will be led by Jason Goodwin. We want to begin in September of 2023.

Pastors, we need you to join us and help in teaching other men. The cost of each trip will range from \$2,750 – \$3,000 based on airfare at the time. The cost will cover airfare, lodging, food, and transportation.

If you are unable to travel, would you consider giving \$50.00 monthly to help

with the cost of feeding and travel for the international pastors and church planters attending the Barnabas Touch training and teaching?


ECCL. 8:8 is pretty clear about that, "There is no man that hath power over the spirit to retain the

For some undisclosed reason, God




made a real mess of those additional fifteen years.
