

"To Save a City" By Chris Gonthier, BMAO Moral Action

What do we do when there is so much chaos all around us? Everywhere that we turn we see one problem after another.

"In those days there was no king in Israel: every man did that which was right in his own eyes." Judges 21:25

People are of the mindset that they are the authority and that they make the best decisions. This is especially true for the true Bible believer. I've tried hard to apply Biblical principals of doing things honestly and ethically the entire time I have been serving on the city council.

No matter what is done it is always wrong and offensive to some people.

Ephesians 6:13 tells us, "Wherefore take unto you the whole armor of God, that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand."

Christians today seem to be "eat up" with apathy. Either we are oblivious to what is going on around us, or people just no longer care. Christians need to be taking stands for righteousness to show to world the way of the Lord.

The idea of what a Christian should be is very warped and inaccurate. Let us look to see how Jesus acted and how he stood against evil, hopefully learning what he expects from us.

Matthew 12:34-37 tells us, "O generation of vipers, how can ye, being evil, speak good things? For out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaketh. A good man our of the good treasure of the heart bringeth forth good things: and an evil man out of the evil treasure bringeth forth evil things..."

Jesus did not stand idlily by as evil took place around him. Jesus stood against the evil of his day. He was not apathetic, but he was both proactive and reactive to those things around him.

Matthew 23:27 says, "Woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For ye are like unto whited sepulchres, which indeed appear beautiful outward, but are within full of dead men's bones, and of all uncleanness." He was speaking to the religious leaders of the day and was pointing out their hypocrisy and wickedness. He called them a bunch of graves.

Too often we do not take a stand when we should because we do not want confrontation, or we are concerned about the fallout of our actions. As believers we are ambassadors for Christ, and we have a message to bring to the world. We do not share the Lord's message when we hide in shadows or ignore the evil that is going on around us.

Most people, when they think of Jesus today, picture a mild-mannered wimp with no backbone. They get hung up on the idea that God is love, and they forget he has other qualities as well.

Jesus was a man that did not put up with nonsense. The saying "what would Jesus do?" would be better stated as, "What did Jesus do?' or "What would Jesus really do?"

For example in John 2:15-16 we see the following, "And when he had made a scourge of small cords, he drove them all out of the temple, and the sheep, and the oxen; and poured out the changer's money, and overthrew the tables; And said unto them that sold doves, Take these things hence; make not my Father's house an house of merchandise."

Jesus was not a spineless wimp, but rather he was a man of conviction who stood against the evils of his day. So if the Lord stood so strongly against evil, then why do we think it is ok to not take a stand?

There are many areas of our lives today that are full of opportunities to take stands for the Lord. We have family, work, church, school, government, and our own personal centers of influence that are specific to us. The old saying that we are the only Bible some will ever read does have an element of truth.

If our lives were the only thing influencing someone, would we point them toward Christ? Or would we be driving them away from Christ? I am not looking forward to the day I will have to answer for what I have done, or what I have failed to do regarding pointing others to Christ. Before we go and do battle for the Lord we must spiritually prepare ourselves.

In Ephesians 6:10-20 we see the following, "Finally, my brethren, be strong in the Lord, and in the power of his might. Put on the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil."

"For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places. Wherefore take unto you the whole armor of God, that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand."

"Stand therefore, having your loins girt about with truth, and having on the breastplate of righteousness; And your feet shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace; Above all, taking the shield of faith, wherewith ye shall be able to quench all the fiery darts of the wicked. And take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God: Praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit, and watching thereunto with all perseverance and supplication for all saints."

"And for me, that utterance may be given unto me, that I may open my mouth boldly, to make known the mystery of the gospel, For which I am an ambassador in bonds: that therein I may speak boldly, as I ought to speak."

Notice that we are told that we are in for a battle, or a fight. We are to "wrestle" and we need armor. The battle is real, and we need to be prepared. A good study of these verses would be prudent, and I may discuss them in the near future.

I wish to now focus on an example of how we can take a stand. One area where the Christians have neglected is in government. We hear all about separation of church and state and are scared away from becoming involved in political matters. This leaves the direction of political decision to be made by unbelievers. It is no wonder that governmental trends are rapidly falling away from God.

Let me be clear on one thing, NOWHERE in the constitution will you find the words or the concept of separation of church and state. Our forefathers intended for Christians to be involved in government. Not only do we have the right, but we have the duty to make our world a better place.

I currently serve on the city council and frequently have to try and steer policy based on biblical/constitutional principles. Please

We must watch our words. Kind words glorify God and brings blessings, confidence and healing to others.

A word spoken is implanted in the mind of the hearer for ever. It's like squeezing toothpaste from a tube. Once it's out, it ain't gonna go back in.



I recall one church that I went to as a new pastor. I had prepared my sermon from Acts 17:22-34 about Paul's sermon on Mars Hill. I had titled the sermon "The Unknown God."

Saturday night the song leader called me at home and asked what my sermon was going to be on the next morning. He told me he wanted to select songs that would support the sermon text.

That sounded good although I had only had one other song leaded ever ask about my sermon beforehand. I gave him the title and Scripture text.

The next day each of his songs were about the different aspects and the greatness of God.

At the conclusion of the service, the song leader stopped beside me at the back door where I was shaking hands with the membership. Before I could say thank you, or anything else, this song leader snorted and said, "There wasn't anything amazing about that! I called him up last night and found out what he was going to preach on and chose the songs that went along with the sermon!"

Dear churches of the BMA,

We greet you in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. We pray that God is blessing you and using you to exalt his Son. It is our prayer that God is using you mightily in his mission to make disciples of all nations.

We are writing this letter to inform you of an issue that has come to our attention. Several pastors from Africa, some connected to the BMA and others with no connection at all to the BMA, have been contacting churches, pastors, and individuals directly asking for financial help.

We would like to ask you to please refrain from supporting any of these individuals directly. We are asking this so we may be good stewards of God's money. For instance, one of these individuals asked for money for Bibles, but \$10,000.00 has already been given for Bibles in this region.

Others are asking for money for building projects. We have a program in place to help with these projects: it is called the principle of the thirds. We ask the church to raise one-third of the project, and then we will loan them one-third interest free. Afterward we will gift them one-third from donations from generous church members like yourselves. If funds are given directly to individuals, the program of the thirds will fall apart.

The motivation of the principle of the thirds is twofold. First, we want the churches to take ownership of their own building projects. Second, we hope they will learn that we want to work with them and not for them.

There have been many other requests for funds, ranging from help with medical bills to buying vehicles. Some of these requests may be legitimate, but there is no way to know when they do not come through the proper channels. We already have channels in place for these countries to make their needs known in the United States.

We say that our church is "tiny but mighty", because the Lord answers all of our prayers. We need them more than ever!

Lynn has traveled to the Mayo Clinic in Arizona to be with her and has only recently returned.

I just want to say I'm thankful for Steve and Lynn's influence in my life and in the church for many years.

Steve has been my example and mentor in evangelism and ministry in general, and there have been countless stories of lives that have been touched, especially among some of the most needy and underserved people in Norman.

I'm thankful that through their leadership we have had the opportunity to love and serve so many of these people in Norman and the surrounding region that no other churches have been reaching.
