Our "security" comes from a good job, or our government. "Peace" comes from our knowledge and understanding. We find "strength" in ourselves, and for "direction", everyone does what is right in his own eyes.

Rather than understanding these and other important issues biblically we search diligently to find them in locations they are not. This is both frustrating and futile. A walk through the Bible will help us to reset and properly focus.

Happiness

Proverbs 3:13-14, "Happy is the man that findeth wisdom, and the man that getteth understanding. For the merchandise of it is better than the merchandise of silver, and the gain thereof than fine gold."

We cannot and will not find true wisdom in the world. James 1:5 tells us, "If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not; and it shall be given him." So while we listen to liberal talk shows, and let the government and media indoctrinate us, we ignore the true source of wisdom.

Sometimes we find happiness in suffering for Christ's sake. 1 Peter 3:14, "But and if ye suffer for righteousness' sake, happy are ye: and be not afraid of their terror, neither be troubled."

Even though this verse is clear, most lack the resolve to allow it to manifest in their lives. We can be happy if we allow God to correct us.

Job 5:17, "Behold, happy is the man whom God correcteth: therefore despise not thou the chastening of the Almighty."

However, our pride and arrogance will not allow us to submit to the one who truly can help us.

Joy

Perhaps one of the greatest misconceptions Christians have is the misunderstanding of true joy. Even the word is used incorrectly in today's society.

We have heard about joy rides at the amusement park. They should actually be called thrill rides. Yes, they offer moments of legitimate excitement, but so too does a face-to-face encounter with a grizzly bear.

What does the bible say about joy? Psalm 16:11 says, "Thou wilt shew me the path of life: in thy presence is fulness of joy; at thy right hand there are pleasures for evermore."

So we get joy by maintaining a presence with God. This is one reason

why our spiritual walk with God is so important.

Another important truth is the role that salvation plays in having joy. Isaiah 61:10 tells us, "I will greatly rejoice in the Lord, my soul shall be joyful in my God; for he hath clothed me with the garments of salvation, he hath covered me with the robe of righteousness, as a bridegroom decketh himself with ornaments, and as a bride adorneth herself with jewels."

Also realizing that God is the source of all our needs brings that joy. John 16:24, "Hitherto have ye asked nothing in my name: ask, and ye shall receive, that your joy may be full."

We ask others for that which we should be asking of God, because only He can supply. Isaiah 12:3, "Therefore with joy shall ye draw water out of the wells of salvation." God supplies the wells.

Security

We must understand that we are not citizens of this world, but only sojourners, just passing through. People want assurances of their eternal resting place.

John 10:28 tells us, "And I give unto them eternal life; and they shall never perish, neither shall any man pluck them out of my hand."

Notice with clarity who the one is that controls our security; it is God. Again, recognize the important role that salvation plays here as well.

John 5:24, "Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that heareth my word, and believeth on him that sent me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation; but is passed from death unto life."

We need to take comfort in Jude 1:24, "Now unto him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of his glory with exceeding joy."

It is all about God and not about me. We all know how flawed we really are, so quit trying to base security on ourselves and just give it to God.

Peace

"...therefore, to him that knoweth to do good and doeth it not, to him it is sin." James 4:17

"But be ve doers of the word, and not hearers only deceiving your own selves." James 1:22

Lastly the fourth son, who went in the fall, shook his head saying, "I will agree it was a

After each son had had his say, the father spoke with a twinkle in his eye. "No need to disagree, all of you is right!"

The son's looked at one another in confusion. "How can that be Father", asked one, "we each are quite sure of what we saw, and being quite different, it could not have been the same tree." The other brothers nodded their heads in agreement.

Smiling, the wise father replied, "Ahh, my son, but it was the same tree; the very one I sent you to observe. The contrast lies in the time at which you went. Your visits came at different seasons of the tree's life."

We would all be wise to take heed to this father's lesson.

In Scripture the Lord tells that there are levels of spiritual maturity. In 2 Peter 3:18, Peter encourages us to grow. "But grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. To him be glory both now and for ever. Amen."

And again in 1 Peter 2:2; "As newborn babes, desire the sincere milk of the word that ye may grow thereby:"

It stands to reason that not all Christians are at the same level of spiritual maturity. Yet often times we tend to get spiritual maturity mixed up with physical maturity.

Physical maturity is easily discerned by sight, but not so spiritual. A fit throwing toddler or a selfish child's behavior is simply dismissed, no offense taken due to their age.

Yet, a 65 year old man or woman throwing a fit at a business meeting is not easily overlooked; we expect more from them. Older does not

necessarily mean more mature in matters concerning Christians.

An 80 year old with 50 years of salvation and church membership under their belt could still be a babe in Christ. While a 16 year old with only three years of salvation and church membership could be quite mature in the Lord.

People, in time, will automatically mature physically. But with Christians, spiritual growth and maturity have nothing to do with time; it takes commitment, and effort.

I have seen many conflicts arise and offense be taken because of the spiritual immaturity of a Christian. Do not misunderstand. I am not saying that unacceptable behavior that is damaging to the church or others should be overlooked.

But many times a babe or child in Christ might say or do something that can be tolerated due to their spiritual "age".

There is an amazing correlation between characteristics of physical and spiritual maturity. By looking at these it might enable us to recognize those still in their spiritual childhood and help us to give them the patience and love they need.

First let's look at babies. They can be quite demanding and must be cared for and nurtured with much gentleness and attentiveness. Having no understanding other than to have their needs fulfilled as quickly as possible, their focus is strictly on self.

Babies must be served constantly as they have no ability to serve others.

Babes in Christ also need a great deal of attention. They are quite selfish in their dealings with others, and expect to be served rather than serve.

Scriptural knowledge other than their

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"Leaders Who Multiply"

"To add growth, lead followers. To multiply, lead leaders." John Maxwell

At BMA Global we are blessed and fortunate to have these kinds of leaders around the world. God's call to leadership requires a focus on leading others to lead others who lead others. The challenge is not just teaching people to live like Jesus but to lead like Jesus.

Second Timothy 2:2 talks about discipleship to the fourth generation (Paul, Timothy, faithful men, others), and God has enabled BMA Global to see this principle lived out right before our eyes in Nicaragua, Mexico, and the Garifunas, just to name a few.

BMA Global's second value statement tells us that "the entire context of the New Testament is one of multiplication. All healthy believers and churches will multiply. The multiplication of disciples is the most important factor in the formula for multiplication."

We are blessed to be watching the multiplication of disciples, leaders, and churches. Mac Lake refers to discipleship as "intimacy with Jesus" and leadership as "influence for Jesus."

Discipleship focuses on character, and the journey of leadership development is being carried out by adding competencies and skill sets to the character building seen through discipleship.

In Gaining by Losing, J. D. Greear gives five essential traits of multiplying leaders, areas for leaders to think through and wrestle with by applying them to their ministry context. In *Spiritual Leadership*, Henry and Richard Blackaby state, "Spiritual leadership is moving people on to God's agenda."

Thankfully we are witnessing this and seeing godly leaders focused on developing and raising up more godly leaders.

C.S. Lewis said, "The church exists for nothing else but to draw men into Christ and make them little Christ's. If they are not doing that, all the cathedrals, clergy, missions, sermons, even the Bible itself, are simply a waste of time."

The first essential trait is clarity. In our recent Global Care Conference, Drew Cline stated, "Clarity is kindness." My, how true this is, because one of the greatest landmines in ministry is unrealistic expectations.

Leaders realize that some people have expectations they will never be able to live up to. Why? Because they just are not realistic.

In leadership, your team must be able to see what you see. Thankfully, at BMA Global there are leaders around the world who are able to envision what God is desiring to do: godly leaders seeking God's agenda with their eyes fixed on the mission of God.

They can state it and teach it, and they are repeating it.

The second essential is familiarity, repeating it over and over. You will be tempted to think, "Oh, they already know this" or "They are tired of hearing this."

Actually, that is when they are just beginning to hear it, understand it, and own it.

BMA Global has stated over and over again clearly that we need leaders to "Go, Disciple, Plant, Repeat!" The best that can be said is what God has already said. It is not about a bunch of new facts or new discoveries that are needed.

It is becoming more deeply aware of the things God has already said in his Word and doing them. Thankfully, those are the kinds of leaders God has given us.

Another essential trait of a multiplying leader is proximity. People's lives only

change when they see change modeled. Developing leaders who multiply is less about a class where you teach leaders and more about a life that you model in front of them.

In *The Multiplication Effect* Mac Lake states, "He [Jesus] didn't just randomly and spontaneously choose these men and invest in them-he had spent time getting to know them and letting them get to know Him. He walked with them, taught them, modeled evangelism with them, prayed for them, and invited them to walk alongside him."

BMA Global leaders are modeling this very principle.

The fourth essential trait of a multiplying leader is equity, because the ultimate goal is the transfer of leadership. The goal is not getting someone to help you but getting them to lead it, own it, and take responsibility for it.

BMA Global's fifth value statement says that "the mission of God must be carried out according to indigenous principles. We are the scaffolding, not the edifice. Our goals are for sustainability and reproducibility."

This truth is modeled in Nicaragua where our American missionaries left over 35 years ago. There were nine organized churches then, and today there are almost fourteen with ten current church plants and a vision to plant ten more.

The fifth essential trait of a multiplying leader is humility. Leaders who are willing to lead with an open hand. They refuse to hold on too tightly to those they develop but are focused instead on equipping, empowering, and releasing.

Our goal in leadership is the multiplication of disciples, leaders, and churches. It is humbling because many times these leaders have watched their "best" disciples be the very ones with the desire to leave and multiply.

The temptation is to hold on to them, but spiritual leadership rejects the desire to control and instead is driven by a heart to commission others into his mission.

Educating the Children of America

Recently, a group of activists marched in New York City chanting, "We're coming for your children." Audacious behavior like this makes it easier than ever to see the sharp differences between Christian and secular worldviews.

Godly Christian parents still acknowledge Solomon's wisdom. when he wrote, "Train up a child in the way he should go" (Proverbs 22:6).

God's Word, infinitely superior to the ways of man, gives parents clear guidance. Deuteronomy 6:7 says, "And thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up."

The passage couldn't be any more specific. The directive for the education of children is specifically given to parents.

The New Testament confirms this important precept. Describing the life of young children, Paul wrote that they are "under tutors and governors until the time appointed of the father" (Galatians 4:2).

Even when parents employ professional educators, it is the responsibility of the parent to set the parameters.

In the thinking of many secularists today, children belong to the state or to the community. Many people believe that schools have a duty to indoctrinate children, even against the express wishes of their parents.

As far back as 1943, the Supreme Court warned against this sort of thinking. In Barnette v. West Virginia State Board of Education, the Court wrote as follows:

Free public education, if faithful to the ideal of secular instruction and political neutrality, will not be partisan or enemy of any class, creed, party, or faction.

Struggles to coerce uniformity of sentiment in support of some end thought essential to their time and country have been waged by many good as well as by evil men.

Those who begin coercive elimination of dissent soon find themselves exterminating dissenters. Compulsory unification of opinion achieves only the unanimity of the graveyard.

Many parents today realize that a lot of professional educators believe it is their duty to establish "compulsory unification of opinion." Some educators realize that parents will push back if they promote gender transition, so they make a strong effort to conceal their actions in this regard.

Knowing that libraries are considered places of academic learning, some schools feature books - even for young children - that are sexually explicit.

Parents have to decide whether their children should be enrolled in public schools or in private schools or whether they should be homeschooled. But when children are in public schools, parents need to be fully aware of the potential dangers and of their legal rights.

Parents need to know if their children can opt out of certain assignments or activities, and they must closely monitor the influences their children are receiving in school.

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does not have. I can offer someone ten dollars, but I cannot offer them ten million dollars.

Simply put, I do not have ten million dollars. The world does not have peace; therefore it cannot give you peace.

Philippians 4:7, "And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus."

The world does not have anything good to offer to you. John 16:33, These things I have spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace. In the world ye shall have tribulation: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world."

The way to receive peace is to overcome the world by depending on God. Psalm 29:11 tells us, "The Lord will give strength unto his people; and the Lord will bless his people with peace."

Proverbs 3:5-6, "Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge him, and he shall direct thy paths."

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acceptance of salvation is very small. You'll find them to be quite helpless concerning scripture, doctrine, Christ-like conduct, and very weak.

Thessalonians 5:14, Now we exhort you, brethren , . . . support the weak, be patient toward all men.

Toddlers can be very tiring. You will find them frequently in trouble, always arguing with other children and demanding their own way. They are quite vocal about opposition and are known for frequent outbursts.

Their dealings with others are a bit on the petty side: who's first, what belongs to whom, who got the biggest or the best, etc. These pint size people are quickly frustrated and easily give up without a great deal of encouragement. Attention spans are short and they must be amused to be content.

Christians at this stage are marked by eruptions of anger, tantrums, and a contentious spirit. Most of these conniption fits concern petty things.

One of their main concerns is if their "perceived" rights have been violated or might have been infringed upon by another. It is of no concern to them how these rages affect those around them, having things THEIR way is the focus.

They are pretty rebellious and dislike being told what to do. 2 Timothy 2:25 In meekness instructing those that oppose themselves; if God peradventure will give them repentance to the acknowledging of the truth;

Juniors are maturing and may appear further a long than they are. But situations quickly reveal they have far to go. Concentrated effort must be made to keep them on the right track. They are still easily distracted and always looking for entertainment.

When in fault they result to making

excuses, or blaming others for their misconduct.

This holds true for "junior" Christians also. You'll find them quickly excited about new concepts or service, but they lack the commitment to follow through. They are also easily frightened by things they do not understand.

For example, a false teacher might share untruths with them, say, security of the believer. Because of their limited understanding and knowledge of God's Word, they do not have the truth to anchor them, and will believe the lie or fear if they are truly saved.

Their relationship with God is still an emotional one, not a complete faith and truth one. Ephesians 4:14, "Be no more children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness, by which they lie in wait to deceive."

Teens are more matured, but have a tendency to be easily swayed. Their need for acceptance drives them to act unwisely. For a while they act mature, and then suddenly do something that leads us to think, "What on earth were they thinking!?"

As most of us know, NO ONE knows MORE than a teenager THINKS they do! While they are responsible much of the time, they are not yet consistent or dependable. They make decisions by how they feel not by understanding.

"Teen" Christians are also quite unpredictable and often act without thinking. For a time they will conduct themselves as mature believers, then out of the blue, they do something foolish. We are shocked because we thought they knew better!

Choices are based on the strength of their emotions not the strength of their relationship with Christ.

How many times have you heard

"It stands to reason that not all Christians are at the same level of spiritual maturity. Yet often times we tend to get spiritual maturity mixed up with physical maturity." someone say that they don't need to be in classes because they already know it all? That's a sure sign of their level of maturity.

It isn't unusual for these believers to be put in positions of leadership too soon, only to disappoint everyone when they fizzle out somewhere along the way.

True adults are mature but always growing and learning. They are responsible not only in the tasks assigned to them, but also in their decisions, conduct and speech. They are dependable and will do whatever it takes to get the job done, even if it means personal sacrifice.

The needs and feelings of others are put before their own. Younger people look to them for sound guidance and advice.

Mature Christians are no different. They are the pillars of the assembly, peacemakers, and totally dependable. Their choices are consistently based on God's Word and His wisdom. They are totally committed and understand what needs to be done. You'll find them among the 10% of the church that are doing the work.

In our families there are members at all levels of maturity and the same is true with our church families. God wants his family to grow up. Those that are fathers and mothers are given the responsibility of discipling the younger ones in love, being gentle and long suffering.

Are you sensitive to the maturity of your brothers and sisters in Christ you labor with in His work? Are you possibly expecting too much from the "babes, toddlers, juniors and teens"? Are there some you are coddling and hindering from growing as they should? Last of all, are you "all growed up" yourself? How you respond to and deal with these babes is an indicator of your spiritual maturity.

Each of us needs to prayerfully consider this and do a thorough self-examination to see if we are where the Lord wants us to be.

I think the Lord said it all when it comes to dealing with those that maybe have not progressed as far in spiritually in 2 Timothy 2:24. "And the servant of the Lord must not strive; but be gentle unto all men, apt to teach, patient,..."
